TASK B:

A phone conversation - Irene & Ron

- I: Hello. Irene Curtis of Australian Meat.
- R: Hello, it's Ron here. As you can imagine, I'm very curious about how the meeting went with the people from Tesco Supermarkets.
- I: I think it went quite well. They sent three people here.
- R: Oh, that's certainly a good sign. I was expecting maximum two.
- I: Yes, there was Andy Williams, who is in charge of meat purchasing. Didn't you meet him when you were in England last month?
- R: Yes, I did. He actually seemed quite interested in our speciality, Kangaroo meat. He's looking for something new to extend their range of products.
- I: Well, he asked me lots of questions about our quality control.
- R: I thought he would. But I'm sure you could convince him that there's nothing to worry about.
- I: Sure. Then there was Jeremy Burns, head of the import department.
- R: Did Stephanie Meyers from finance come, too?
- I: She was on holiday, so they sent Melanie Powell from marketing instead.
- $R: \ \ I \ see. \ I \ didn't \ meet \ those \ two \ when \ I \ was \ over \ there. \ Did \ you \ do \ a \ tour \ of \ the \ factory?$
- I: Well, there wasn't time to show them everything, but we looked at the processing units, the packaging department and the freezer units.

 Then Mat and I gave them our latest powerpoint presentation and later we took them out to dinner.
- R: Great. What was their reaction? Did they say if they were going to place an order?
- 1: Well, I haven't got anything definite yet. But I think they were quite impressed and they said they would let us know in the next couple of days.
- R: Were there any problems?
- 1: At first they were a bit worried about British customers accepting our product. You know with the Brits being animal lovers and all that. They weren't sure if kangaroo meat would be accepted as an alternative to beef.
- R: Kangaroos are too cute to be eaten, aren't they?
- 1: Something like that. Well, I told them they are not exactly an endangered species. There are twice as many kangaroos in Australia as there are Australians. We have had kangaroo meat on the menu for years. They agreed that it tastes good. And then there's the cost factor. Since they are cheap to keep and don't need a lot of care or infrastructure, their meat is very reasonably priced; definitely cheaper than a beef steak.
- R: Moreover it's a really healthy alternative. It's got ten times less fat than the average beef steak.
- I: And there is no chance of getting mad cow disease, either!
- R: Right.
