CLOTHES LINE - CLIMATE-FRIEND OR COMMUNITY-ENEMY?

Rules imposed by community associations in the USA forbid tens of millions of American home owners to dry their washing outside because, the associations say, it's unsightly and even lowers property prices. But a number of 'clothes line rebels' have risked legal action by disobeying these rules, saying it is the duty of Americans to reduce their carbon footprint and leave their energy-hungry tumble driers switched off. **Below is a selection of your comments.**

- A Personally, I don't hang my washing out on the line because I feel it's exposing myself. Living here in the north of England, where it can be fairly windy, there have been times when my washing has disappeared over the hedge and going round to ask if you can have your undies back is embarrassing. Secondly, it's just too much like hard work!
- **B** I love seeing washing blowing on a line it's comforting, familiar, and restful. I own a tumble drier but have never used it (it came as part of the washing machine, which was a present) as I much prefer hanging washing out. It smells better, it feels better, it generally irons better, it costs less and it doesn't destroy the environment. I just can't comprehend this thing some people have about washing being "common" (hence lowering house prices). How does seeing that someone is doing washing lower house prices?
- C Look, ordinarily, I'm all for joking about my fellow countrymen. But there's an important point that seems to have been overlooked by the majority of your responses: this is not a nationwide or even state law. It is, instead, the act of "community associations," which in America refers to the developers of private, condominium complexes. They have the right to make whatever rules they like, and if you don't like their rules, then you buy a property elsewhere. So, to those complaining, I say this: We're still at liberty to let our socks and shirts fly in the breeze of the Land of the Free!
- D Generally here in Germany and the Netherlands there are few restrictions but drying outside seems not to be the order of the day. Often houses in the Netherlands have warm, well insulated attics where washing can be hung out of the way here in Germany I have a cellar under the whole of the house where there is an unheated washroom and another room that is heated (we personally hang the washing in the washroom). Funnily enough, in our row of four similar houses, the only people hanging washing outside are our Californian neighbours!
- E The choice really comes down to either buying a relatively new home that is governed by association rules or buying an older home that isn't. Quite a few people only tolerate community association rules because there is no other option when buying a newer property. The prohibition on hanging out laundry is only one of many highly intrusive rules enforced by many home owner associations to present an artificial and idealized view of their community. Unfortunately, the result is a sterile conformity that doesn't reflect real life.
- F I use a gas tumble drier myself, which is standard in every home here. I live on the north edge of the Piney Woods. We have no basement. If you dry your clothes outside, they get full of pollen. As for the carbon footprint, we mostly don't believe it. The news last night carried a report on the effects of a new proposed 'green' tax. If Congress passed that, the economy would be decimated and the temperature would be reduced by .0015 degrees in 100 years. Not a heck of a lot of difference. What it would do is make Al Gore and friends a ton of cash.

WHY ARE WE PLAGUED BY JELLYFISH?

Jellyfish numbers appear to be on the rise in UK waters, research suggests. Why?

With the number of jellyfish rising around Britain's coastline, it's not only beachgoers who have to watch out. Torness nuclear power plant in Scotland recently had to shut down after moon jellyfish blocked the water intake system.15........ Some areas, including the Irish Sea and the east coast of Scotland, have been invaded by so many that they now resemble a "jellyfish soup", says the Marine Conservation Society (MCS). So why the increase?

According to research, there is strong evidence that an increase is linked to three main factors - pollution, overfishing and possibly climate change.

This is causing increased nutrients in the water, which in turn can boost jellyfish numbers as the nutrients increase plankton which jellyfish feed on.

Overfishing means jellyfish do not face their usual predators and competitors.

It is argued that climate change can cause more favourable conditions for jellyfish. Their adaptability, some biologists claim, gives them an advantage over some other sea creatures.

EcoJel's project involves tagging jellyfish to study their movements. Monitoring jellyfish numbers is important because they are an indication of the state of oceans. If they overtake fish and start to dominate an area, this can cause environmental and economic problems, says Dr Hobson.20.......

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
